

Cornelius N. Grove, Ed.D.

A native of Lancaster County, PA, Cornelius Grove grew up and attended high school in Chattanooga, TN. He attended Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, MD, receiving the B.A. and M.A.T. degrees. The Hopkins faculty honored him as "the student who contributed the most to the life of the university."

Cornelius began his professional career as a secondary school history teacher and guidance counselor in White Plains, NY. After three years, he joined Harcourt Brace & World Publishing Company as an editor and writer. Following similar work for a small publishing firm, he became a technical writer at the IBM Corporation.

Beginning in 1971, he and his British wife spent two years traveling in Europe and Africa and sojourning in Portugal. Returning to the U.S., Cornelius entered Columbia





During the Spring term of 1986, Cornelius served as a visiting professor at Beijing Foreign Studies University. He taught two graduate courses and, with Prof. Hu Wenzhong, began co-authoring a book on cultural differences between Chinese and Americans, first published during 1990. The 3rd edition of *Encountering the Chinese: An Ancient Country, A Modern Culture* appeared in 2010.

In 1990, Cornelius founded *Cornelius Grove & Associates* to consult on cross-cultural business issues. He quickly entered into partnership with anthropologist Willa Hallowell. Their firm, doing business as **GROVEWELL LLC**, served corporations worldwide through 2020. With nearly 100 associates in 31 nations, GROVEWELL specialized in global leadership coaching and expatriate family coaching.

In 1998, Cornelius was named a Charter Fellow of the International Academy for Intercultural Research (IAIR). At a conference in Singapore in 2005, he presented a major paper, "Understanding the Two Instructional Style Prototypes: Pathways to Success in Internationally Diverse Classrooms," which now may be read at ResearchGate.net. More recently, he was invited to contribute entries for two new encyclopedias including, for both, an entry on his specialty, pedagogy across cultures.

In *The Aptitude Myth: How an Ancient Belief Came to Undermine Children's Learning Today* (2013), Cornelius reveals the history behind the belief of many Americans that a child's capacity for learning in school is inborn and fixed; effortful studying accomplishes little. The Aptitude Myth.info.
